2.1.3 Feedback on Curriculum	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Feedback on curriculum is collected from students, alumni, parents, community and academic peers. • All feed backs are sent to the Magadh University to design and modify the course curricula.
2.1.4 Curriculum Update	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The University modifies the existing courses as per the emerging National and global trends from time to time. • The university ensures that the curriculum is based on the core values adopted by NAAC. • The parent university has not yet implemented academic and examination reforms mandated by the UGC.

2.2.3 Teaching-Learning Process:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The College follows the academic calendar of Magadh University. • Lecture method of teaching is supplemented by seminars and audio-visual methods. • Student – Teacher ratio needs substantive improvement by increasing the number of teachers. • Modern teaching aids are yet to be extended to conventional courses.
2.2.4 Teacher Quality:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The College has 93 permanent teachers and 32 sanctioned numbers of positions are lying vacant. • 95% Teachers are with Ph.D. Degree. • The teaching staff is selected by the University Selection Committee.

However the university has still not adopted UGC regulation 2010. • The evaluation methods are made known to the students through the College Magazines, circulars, notices and website. • The college provides for internal assessment in Professional Courses. However college should evolve innovative methods of continuous evaluation for all courses.

In addition, library resources need to be augmented by subscription to INFLIBNET e-consortium.

2.4.5 Other Facilities:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The College has adequate staff rooms, common rooms for boys and girls, vehicle parking facility, canteen and a guest house. • Boy's hostel is under renovation and a girl's hostel is under construction.
2.4.6 Best Practices in the development of Infrastructure and Learning Resources (If any):	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The infrastructure has been augmented to cope with the academic growth.

3.2 Institutional Weaknesses:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Lack of formal consultancy. • Placement activities are limited in scope. • Regular academic audit is not yet in place. • Quality control through IQAC is not vigorous enough. • Overall learning resources are limited. • Consultancy is weak.
3.3 Institutional Challenges:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Expansion of facilities for language learning. • Becoming part of NKN to access e-learning sources. • Getting rid of intermediate classes from the college. • Establishing central instrumentation facility for sciences. • Creating residential accommodation for students, teachers and staff.
3.4 Institutional Opportunities:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Expansion of vocational / professional courses. • Enhancement of Placement activities. • Scope for harnessing the existing goodwill among stakeholders for further development of the college. • Strengthening of ICT based teaching and learning. • Implementation of UGC guidelines for academic / examination reforms and teacher performance evaluation.

- Residential accommodation for students, teachers and staff be created.
- Student – Teacher ratio be improved by increasing number of teachers.
- Efforts be made to remove the intermediate section from the college for effect functioning.
